Harvest Reflection...

Last month, Michele looked at the subject of gratitude and encouraged us to be thankful. Harvest is a time when we bring in the fruits of our labours and farmers in our area will have been harvesting, packing and gathering in. They prepare, plant and harvest their crops, yet the harvest will be only as good as the weather. In France this year many vineyards had to bring in grapes early due to the heatwave and although we can

reflect on receiving the benefits of our labour, there is an element of not quite knowing what the harvest will be. Some might argue that this is due to the greater mercy of God in the provision weather. Whether the harvest is good

or bad, the input from the farmer and others who grow crops will be the same. Likewise in life, the input we give to our jobs, family, friends and community will bring many blessings. The other side of generosity is the concept of receiving. The farmer receives his harvest, and we will receive the benefits of our labour in wages or maybe from our investments as we get older - yet many struggle with the idea of receiving from others. The idea that we may need to ask for help, whether that be families going to the DENS food bank or asking your employer for a payrise tends to bring up issues around pride, and yet our attitude to how we learn to

receive from others will often be the foundation to how we learn to serve and give.

In my experience it is more often than not harder to receive than to give. Yet at the heart of the Christian message is the notion of receiving unconditional love, mercy and grace from God. We may take this for granted, yet in seeking to understand the implications of this and experiencing an unconditional love: when



we have lost our temper, let somebody down disappointed them, does not seem congruent. Some of us may think that we don't ever need to receive - as we have worked hard, invested ..starts the receiving process well and provided for our Jim Rohn families, and to an extent

> you would be right, however, our attitudes and thoughts on receiving, seeking help and support will mould us into better givers.

> My challenge to you then at this harvest time is to try to open yourself to the possibility of receiving in a new way. This may be just seeking some advice or looking for someone to help around the house or garden. I sense we might learn much about ourselves as Christians and much about a loving, generous God who blesses us with a harvest, whether we have carried out the hard work or not.

Halloween will soon be with us and is great fun especially for the kids, but it is only for one evening. Extend the party and feel good as well. How? By making Pumpkin soup. Don't throw away the pumpkin; instead make it into a first class meal. Here is an old French recipe. I have added the potato and carrot, it adds a little sweetness and thickens the soup slightly. Cook, freeze, heat, eat!! Use the pumpkin, (or buy one or two, very cheap after the day)! Pumpkins keep for months in a cool place, as long as it's frost free. You can dry and toast the seeds to eat as well. Pumpkin - around 4lb (2Kg). Medium onion. Large carrot. Large potato. Salt & Pepper. About 3 -3 ½ (2Lt) chicken or vegetable stock. 2 Tablespoons olive oil. 2 cloves garlic peeled and chopped fine. 3 (2pt) milk containers (easiest)

Break, chop or cut the pumpkin up into pieces about 6-8 inches any old shape. If you have a pressure cooker, cook for 3 minutes in about 1pt water. Then just pull the skin off - it's so easy that way. Otherwise, steam or boil 'till soft. Put the flesh and liquid into a preserving pan or divide into smaller portions.

Whilst it cooks, chop the onion up in small pieces with the garlic in a small saucepan and gently simmer in the oil until soft. Chop the potato and carrot into small pieces, in about 2 pints of chicken/vegetable stock and simmer 'til soft.

Then put all the ingredients and liquids into the large pan, mixing well and add salt and pepper to taste. Cool and blitz, adding a little milk or water if you like thinner soup. Bottle. Freeze. Or keep for a week or so in a fridge. Yummy.

Sarratt School sits at the very heart of Sarratt village, both figuratively and geographically. Along with the Church and the shop, the village hall and our three pubs, it is one of the threads that tie us together. We all have a stake in its future, and an interest in its success. We have a wonderful parents' association in SPA, led by the indefatigable Jackie Saraj. And there are opportunities for anyone else who wants to get involved.

Elsewhere in this edition of Spotlight our wonderful Acting Head, Mrs O'Hare, gives an update on school life. [It's on Page 25 - Ed.] But I wanted to write to introduce you to the Governors of the school. We are a group of volunteers who

are responsible for setting the direction of the school and overseeing its management. We are currently eight strong, including Revd Michele and Mrs O'Hare. Most of us have children at the school. Almost everyone lives in or near the village. We are united by a common determination to see the school prosper, giving the best possible education to our children.

Any school has to be judged by the quality of the education it gives. We have watched with pride as the school, after a difficult period, won a glowing endorsement from Ofsted, and increasingly warm reviews from everyone who comes to inspect it.

As a relative newcomer to the village, with my two daughters in the school, it has been a privilege for me to spend the last 18 months on the Governing Body. I have just taken over as Chair from John Manning, with Julie Disdale and Tony Coupland as the Vice-Chairs.

And we are now looking for at least three more Governors - one from the parents, one from the staff, and one from the wider community. If you feel you have skills and experience that would help us achieve our goals, and you would like to apply, then please do get in touch. Alternatively, if you would simply like to make a donation, or sponsor equipment or other vital resources at the school, we would be delighted to hear from you too.

Either way, please take an interest in our school. Whether or not you have children at Sarratt school, it is an important institution for our village, and for the future of our village.

The Governors are also focussed on a number of other priorities, including:

- the ethos of the school: we want to ensure it continues to be caring, warm and respectful. The 'Sarratt Way' is important to our children, so it needs to be important to us as well;
- the school's Christian character: it is proudly a Church of England school, with a strong link to Holy Cross. Revd Michele plays a big role in the life of the school. We want it to stay this way, while still being a school for children of all faiths and of none;
- the school's place in the village: we want the school to play a full role in the life of the village, and for the village to feel part of the school's wider community;
- the school's long-term future: we want to make sure the school has the best possible foundation for the coming years. We know that small village schools like ours are coming under pressure, up and down the country. So we have recommended to our parents and staff that we join a Multi-Academy Trust with Christ Church school in Chorleywood. We believe that, together, we will be stronger, better and more viable for years to come. Our shared plan is for a small, local network of schools that each keep their own character and ethos, but which support each other in pursuit of the highest standards and performance, and which together can make the most of our finite budgets.

At the beginning of September, 1st Sarratt Scouts, Cubs and Beavers re-started their weekly meetings after the summer break, with each Section having a programme of exciting activities planned for the Autumn Term, with the emphasis in September being to get outside as much as possible while the evenings are still light.



This term the Beaver Colony will be working on their Creative, Communicator, Safety and Navigator Activity Badges. They started the new academic year with a games night and welcomed six new Beavers to the Colony. As always a great turn out of parent helpers on the first night! The Beavers will be going on camp in early October to Phasels Wood in Kings Langley, and arranging a night out at Quasar, which is always fun. We have also organised a trip for them to Paradise Wildlife Park in October where the Beavers will have a great day feeding and looking at the animals.

The new term kicked off with their Scientist badge, learning how the heart, circulatory and breathing systems of the human body work, with a some fun exercises in the Dell to test changes in their pulse rate with different levels of exercise. Chris Farman, one of the Assistant Scout Leaders, also talked to the Cubs about how a solar eclipse occurs and shared his photos of the recent eclipse in the United States that he witnessed over the summer. The Cubs have also had an evening out to Phasels Wood playing wide games and taking turns on the climbing wall.



The Scout Troop have been busy setting up a new Owl patrol to accommodate increased numbers, designing a new scout t-shirt to replace the scout shirt at less formal occasions and suggesting activities they would like to do as a Troop. This term we will also be taking part in a survey on the River Chess. Our scouts will also be busy preparing for a county competition and for an incident hike in the local area using all of our skills to navigate to prearranged locations to find food and resources for lunch and dinner, so if you see hungry Scouts in the area please do not feed them!

Sarratt Wildlife Volunteers



On Sunday 10 September, we were again at Commonwood, in the area near to Dellfield on the bottom road. Our task was to rake up the grass which had already been cut. This grassland is left uncut until early September for the benefit of the chalk loving flowers that grow there. Although we are basically on chalk, Sarratt lies mainly on an acid clay top, so chalky areas are in short supply. Beautiful blooms such as Field Scabious, Knapweed, Agrimony, Ladies Bedstraw, Wild Basil and the delicate white Burnet Saxifrage grow here, all beloved by bees and butterflies. Altogether there were 14 different species flowering here before it was cut, and there are more earlier in the year. The cut grass has to be raked and removed so that not too much goodness goes back into the soil – wild flowers thrive on poor soils.

Nine volunteers worked hard and soon finished the task. The sun shone and it's a beautiful place to be with the satisfaction of knowing we are helping the local wildlife.

On **Sunday 8 October** we shall be working at Morton's Pond at the North end of Sarratt Green, to try to remove some of the overgrowth of vegetation to allow more water to fill the pond. Sarratt W.I.

13 September 2016 was the hottest day of that Summer, however, 13 September 2017 must have been one of the coldest, so we at Sarratt WI were happy to be in the Village Hall and settled down to enjoy our speaker Mr Richard Thomas. His talk was entitled "A Walk with the Admiral" We all had our own ideas and expectations as to its content, most assuming seafaring tales about Admiral

Horatio Nelson. However, we were surprised and intrigued when we realised it was about the road named Admiral's Walk in Hoddesdon. Richard



showed us slides of his research which went back to 1521 when the area was just open fields called Ffore Lese Meadow. We saw an early map where the land was divided up and sold, and he told us of various owners until a few buildings began to appear on the land. By the early 19th century the land was owned by Admiral Donat O'Brien, a fascinating and brave character who fought in the

Napoleonic Wars and was captured three times, and imprisoned in France. After each capture, he escaped and walked hundreds of miles through Europe to eventual safety, and it was these walks which inspired the name of the road. We were all hugely impressed by Richard Thomas's vast amount of research, mostly done before the Internet came about. He brought to life many of the occupants of the now busy residential area of Four Leys

Meadow, where he himself has lived for fifty years.

We also made arrangements for our next monthly walk and pub lunch which will be in the

We are now fully up and running with our new school year. After saying goodbye to the children and some staff who have moved to pastures new, we are now welcoming adults and children into our school community. The new reception class have been getting to grips with their new surroundings and are settling in well. We have also welcomed some new members of the teaching team; Miss Heir and Mr Young have joined the team in years 3 and 4. They are both newly qualified teachers and are raring to go with bags of energy and enthusiasm for the job. Mrs. Bailey and Mrs. Pinner are appointed as teaching assistants in years 5 and 6. Mrs. Goldspring, who was with us last year providing class cover, is now teaching in year 5.

We are all delighted with the start of the new academic year and are looking forward to all of the new opportunities and exciting events coming our way.



When our editor first asked me to write my story, my immediate response was which story? Knowing that Mike speaks everyone in the village I wondered if my wife had let slip some family secret or whether he wanted me to write about the day that Margaret Thatcher finally drove me out of the Conservative party. no, it was my cancer he was talking about. I was genuinely surprised as I now consider it a minor inconvenience rather than a big part of my life.

After living in the village for about three years, and having had numerous tests was diagnosed with cancer of the throat in September 2013. A week later I was admitted to the Churchill hospital Oxford and underwent eight hours of surgery. Two weeks later I was home, sans teeth, with most of my tongue and part of my jaw bone removed and eating through a feeding tube. I was offered chemo and radio therapy but refused them as the possible side effects seemed to outweigh the possible benefits – the prospect of possible total

lack of taste had been enough to put me off; I enjoy my red wine too much.

Despite warnings that I might never eat normally or speak again, things were more or less back to normal by Christmas and in the New Year I was back doing a short shift in the village shop. By March the cancer had returned and I underwent further surgery at the Churchill. After another two weeks I was home again, sans even of my tongue, having been told that I really needed chemo and radio this time. treatment lasted six weeks and since August 2014 I have not needed any further treatment apart from some massage to the lymph glands. There were no permanent side effects and my sense of taste was back to normal within two or three weeks.

I was remarkably lucky with the support I received from the NHS and from family and friends without which I would not have got through the experience. I have received more hugs in the last three years than at any time in my life! I genuinely think that the last few years were more stressful for my family than they were for me — patients suffer, their loved ones suffer more.

It is now nearly four years since my first operation and I think of myself as cured. I do not worry about the cancer returning though I would admit to a certain anxiety in the days leading up to my regular, now six monthly, checkups. At no time did I suffer any pain apart from the sore throat that prompted my initial diagnosis. I have lost a lot of weight, a good excuse to replenish my wardrobe. I am not as strong as I once was and have come to accept that I will never windsurf again and that horse riding, which I had gone back to after moving to Sarratt, is a thing of the past – but I continue to swim regularly. Fortunately don't suffer from Ι embarrassment and have come to accept that my speech will always be different from before - no more public speaking but happy to talk in small groups where I can get a word in edgeways. Customers in the village shop seem to understand me and I am only too happy to repeat things when asked.

I have discussed dental implants with my surgeon but he has advised against because of the radio therapy. Recently a young child in the shop asked why I had no teeth. Neither of us was embarrassed but I suspect his mother was. Unfortunately I was too slow to reply that the tooth fairy had stolen them! I have adjusted to eating and need meat and certain vegetables to be processed to the consistency of baby food. Chefs fall over themselves to cater for me and I still eat regularly in restaurants. The Cricketers always does me proud.

I only have myself to blame for the cancer. I was a pipe smoker for over 50 years. Vaping allowed me to give up with ease. I have others to thank for my recovery.



August weather Philip Buller

Someone recently wrote in the Daily Telegraph that in August the British reached for their brollies and turned the heating on. I must confess to having done both! It wasn't a very warm month, temperatures generally staying at or below average. Hottest day was the 28th, Bank Holiday Monday, when the 27.8C mercury reached Nationally this was the hottest late August holiday ever, the previous record of 27.2C was exceeded in many places, the crown going to Holbeach, Lincs at 28.2C. The previous record for Sarratt was 25.7C recorded in 2000. Many have now forgotten that the date for this holiday was changed in 1965 from the first Monday of the month to the last. It's also seemed a wet month with the only really dry spell being the week leading up to and around the Bank Holiday, but I recorded only 50.1 mm [2ins] for the month. This is just 82% of the norm for August. It may come as a surprise, but based on records for the last ten years, August was the third wettest month of the year here in Sarratt and fifth wettest when using 36 years of records. This month also marks the end of the three months of summer [for meteorologists that is] and the total rain for this period came out at 161.6mm [6.4ins], just below the long term average. For the nation as a whole this was the 11th wettest on record, for Sarratt only the 20th!

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
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
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But the best-laid plans ...
